



Determined Admissions Arrangements 2027-2028

St Bernard's High School is a six form, 11-16 school for girls with a co-educational Sixth Form. The school serves the Catholic community of Southend, South East Essex and its surrounding areas. The partnership between home, parish and school is the basis of the school's existence as a centre for the education of all Catholic girls of secondary age in the area.

The Governing Body is the admissions authority and has responsibility for admissions to this school. To enable the school's Governing Body to apply its admissions criteria, it will be necessary for parents to complete the school's Supplementary Information Form (SIF) in addition to the Local Authority form. The local authority undertakes the co-ordination of admission arrangements during the normal admission round (this is for admission to the school at the start of the year in September and not for applications made in-year).

THE ALLOCATION OF PLACES

Oversubscription Criteria

1. Up to 30 pupils granted priority admission on the basis of their performance in the selection test procedure organised by the Consortium of Selective Schools in Essex (and whose normal place of residence lies within the postcode areas of SS0, SS1, SS2, SS3, SS4, SS5, SS6, SS7, SS8 and SS9 (map below). If two or more girls tie for the final selective place, then it will be awarded using the oversubscription criteria below.
2. Catholic looked after and previously looked after girls.
3. *Catholic girls who attend a feeder Catholic primary school, namely: Our Lady of Lourdes, Leigh- on-Sea; St. Helen's, Westcliff-on-Sea; Sacred Heart, Southend- on-Sea; St. Teresa's, Rochford; St. George's, Shoebury; Holy Family, South Benfleet; Our Lady of Ransom, Rayleigh and St Josephs, Canvey Island.
4. Other Catholic girls.
5. Other looked after and previously looked after girls.
6. Catechumens and members of an Eastern Christian Church.
7. Girls of other Christian denomination
8. Girls who might not be catholic but who attend a feeder Catholic primary school, namely: Our Lady of Lourdes, Leigh- on-Sea; St. Helen's, Westcliff-on-Sea; Sacred Heart, Southend- on-Sea; St. Teresa's, Rochford; St. George's, Shoebury; Holy Family, South Benfleet; Our Lady of Ransom, Rayleigh and St Joseph's, Canvey Island.
9. Girls of other faiths whose membership is evidenced by a minister of religion or other religious leader.
10. Remaining applications

Notes:

Preference will be given within each of the above categories according to the following criteria:-

- i. girls with a sibling* at the school or at St. Thomas More High School, Westcliff at the time of admission.
- ii. proximity of the child's home to the school, as measured by the shortest route; those living closest to the school being accorded the highest priority. Where a child resides at more than one address the distance will be measured using the address where they reside for the majority of the time.

Explanatory Information

Definitions

1. Statement of Special Educational Need (SEN) and Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP)

A Statement of Special Educational Need is a statement made by the local authority under Section 324 of the Education Act 1996, specifying the special educational provision required for that child. If the school is oversubscribed, the admission of pupils with a Statement of Special Educational Needs or Education, Health and Care Plan where the school is named in the Statement or Plan, is mandatory.

2. Looked after children and previously looked after children

Children who are in the care of local authorities as defined by Section 22 of the Children Act 1989. In relation to school admissions legislation a 'looked after child' is a child in public care at the time of application to the school. A 'previously looked after child' is a child who was looked after, but ceased to be so because he or she was adopted, or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order. Previously looked after children also includes those children who appear (to the governing body) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. Looked after and previously looked after children are given the appropriate priority for each relevant age group in line with the admission criteria.

3. Siblings

A sibling is defined as the full, half, step, adopted and long term fostered siblings at St Bernard's High School

4. Distance where parents have separated

The distance is measured the same for all applications. Only one application can be received. The LA should not have the details of both parents or know of the marital status of the parents. If more than one application is received from parents, applications will be placed on hold until such time that:

- an application is made that both parents agree to; or written agreement is provided from both parents; or
 - a court order is obtained confirming which parent's application takes precedence'.
- Details on address checks and which address is relevant are also provided in the admission booklet.

In all cases the child's normal place of residence is applicable for the purposes of the application

5. Tie Break

Priority will be given to girls living closest to the school determined by the shortest distance in each category. Distances are calculated [on the basis of a straight-line measurement between the front door of the child's home address (including the community entrance to flats) and the main entrance of the school. In the event of distances being the same for two or more children where this would determine the last place to be allocated, random allocation will be carried out and supervised by a person independent of the school

6. Waiting Lists

Lists for each intake year are kept for students wishing to remain on our waiting list. Admission, if a vacancy becomes available, is strictly in the order of the admissions criteria. Each added child will require the list to be ranked again in line with the published oversubscription criteria. The waiting list is refreshed every academic year and parents/carers are asked to contact the school if they wish to remain on the list otherwise their application is removed from the next academic year. Example if you are on the Year 7 waiting list, you will be removed in September for Year 8 unless you contact the school in writing by the end of August.

7. Over and Under Age Applications

Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. In addition, the parents of a summer born child may choose not to send that child to school until the September following their fifth birthday

To request admission out of normal age group during the transfer process of year 6 to 7:- To request admission out of usual age group applicants must write to the local authority with their request. The local authority will share the details of the request with the school. Parents will be notified of the outcome before the allocation of places and must apply during the main round for the usual age group.

To request admission out of normal age group in-year: To request admission out of usual age group applicants must write to the Head Teacher with their request. The Head Teacher will advise accordingly and will ensure that a formal written outcome is provided.

8. Home Address

To apply for a Year 7 school place after the normal admission cycle or for admission into Years 8-11, parents will need to complete an In-Year Application Form (available from the school and school website).

9. In-Year Admissions

To apply for a Year 7 school place after the normal admission cycle or for admission into Years 8-11, parents will need to complete an In-Year Application Form (available from the school and school website).

10. Appeals

Appeals against a decision of the Governors should be addressed to the Correspondent to the Governors within 2 weeks of the receipt of the decision. These appeals will be considered by an Independent Appeals Committee, before which parents are entitled to attend. 523 applications were received for the Year 7 places for September 2025. 8 on-time appeals were lodged and the Appeals Committee 0 were unsuccessful.

11. Single Sex School

Admission to St Bernard's High school is governed by statutory, i.e. legal, regulations. The principal document is the School Admissions Code (2021) under the terms of which, governors/trust have proposed the school's Admissions Criteria/Determined Admission Arrangements.

The school is also subject to the provisions of all other relevant legal frameworks including current equality legislation. St Bernard's High School is recognised by the Department for Education as a 'single-sex Girls school'. Their school admissions policy makes provision for only girls to enter the school into Years 7 - 11. Legal advice provided on this matter is clear. This provision is dependent on the legal definition of a 'girl', which – as it stands – is a matter of biological sex, as at birth.

There is no provision in law, under the age of 18, for self-identification to override this prescription. St Bernard's High School as a 'single sex girls' school' - is unable, at present, to admit a transgender male at age 11.
